Childhood Cancer Survivors' Day



On 19 June 2021, 36 childhood cancer survivors with their families gathered virtually to celebrate Childhood Cancer Survivors' Day! Themed "Celebration of Life: Gratitude", this year's event aimed at encouraging participants to appreciate the community who had supported them on their childhood cancer journey.

Following a welcome address from CCF CEO, Ms Peng Hai Ying, two CCF childhood cancer survivors, Clement and Qin Han shared their cancer experiences and how practising gratitude had helped empower them to live out their dreams. Their messages resonated with the participants who listened attentively and nodded in agreement, inspired to do the same.

Prior to the session, participants were encouraged to reflect on their personal survivorship journey through a #ImASurvivor journal activity. Survivors recorded the time they last completed treatment and little milestones along the way to celebrate how far they had come. When it was time for a roundtable sharing,

the group found out that some had beaten cancer only recently in the last six months while others had triumphed the illness for as long as 24 years!

Other highlights of the session included a craftwork segment for survivors to express appreciation for their family's support and an End-of-Treatment trophy presentation for newly minted survivors who had recently completed treatment. The different craftworks were eventually pieced together to form a collage, anchoring the message of togetherness and reminding participants that they are never alone on this journey.

Closing the event on a high note, CCF childhood cancer survivor, Stefanie Loh, performed a song and piano item to the tune of 'A Million Dreams' to inspire survivors that they can achieve all that their hearts set out to do. Despite being physically apart, the atmosphere of celebration and support for one another was electrifying as everyone went home with grateful hearts.



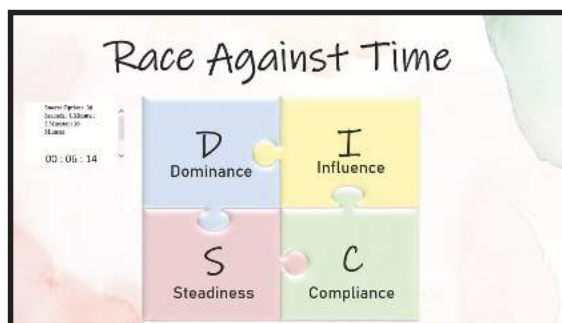
Youth Day Camp 2021



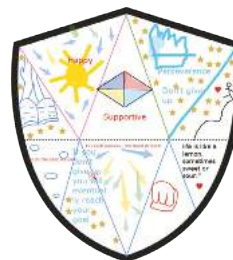
The annual CCF Youth Day Camp, a platform for childhood cancer survivors to connect with one another, took place virtually on 7 August 2021 in line with safe management measures. This year, the camp helped CCF youths develop greater awareness and understanding of their different interpersonal communication styles and behaviours.

Some of the topics covered during the online session included insights on the various types of communication, body languages and behaviours. Participants also learnt about the different characteristics and responses to those communication styles, areas of growth and how these could be incorporated as part of their personal development.

With their newfound knowledge, participants were split into four teams to pit their skills in a game of “Race Against Time”. Everyone was on the edge of their seats, observing intently as their team members dropped clues for them to guess as many right answers as possible. The winning team managed a score of eight correct answers within the 10-minute time limit!



Each team was then briefed to develop their “Group Shield” by identifying their collective strengths and evaluating areas of growth in communications. Little did they know this was to prepare them for the highlight of the camp – a virtual escape room. With only an hour provided, each team was tasked to locate and diffuse “bombs” to prevent a city destruction.



Being physically apart from each other, team members found that they had to speak up more than usual and as clearly as possible to be understood. It made the task more challenging to say the least but after one too many squeals and near misses, the mission was completed!

The session brought about much laughter but also valuable lessons on communicating to be heard and understood. Everyone agreed that it was a fun-filled and insightful day camp and is looking forward to the next one!



SibsConnect 2021 - The Quest for Greatness!



When children are diagnosed with cancer, relationships between the child with cancer and their siblings may become strained due to less time spent together. To deepen the bonds among siblings, CCF organised SibsConnect, a day for them to play and overcome challenges together as a sibling unit. This year, the event took on the form of a board game, with materials delivered to the homes of participants prior to the event date.

On 26 June 2021, 16 sibling units gathered online in eager anticipation of “The Quest for Greatness”. Set against a fictional ‘Jungle of Greatness’ story, siblings took on the role of ‘Jungle Guardians’ who were on a quest to keep out hunters who threatened the jungle’s harmony. To do so, they had to collect sufficient jungle emblems by completing challenges at the four animal tribes - Love Bear, Creativity Monkey, Courage Lion and Patience Owl.

One of the highlights of the game was when Jungle Guardians arrived at the Love Bear tribe and were challenged to complete a series of actions together.

Each sibling unit was tasked to create their unique handshakes, feed each other snacks and share hugs and kisses to express their affections.

Another of the siblings’ favourite challenge was the Creativity Monkey tribe. Standing before a lava floor, the Jungle Guardians had to build a bridge using objects found at home to get across. With teamwork and some creativity, the sibling units went on a hunt around their homes and grabbed pillows, chairs and whatever they could find to lay their bridge and crossed it.

With their collection of hard-earned emblems, the Jungle Guardians emerged victorious! The event ended with an endearing reconnection between siblings, and each one learnt that their shared greatness were the very powers that protected the jungle’s harmony.

Surrounding Them with Care

When an on-and-off fever, constipation and red spots on her daughter's abdomen led to a Leukaemia diagnosis, Azleen and her husband were in denial. After all, CCF beneficiary little Asfa was only two years old and they had just celebrated her birthday. What followed was a blur of hospital visits and new faces, as doctors and nurses began her treatment.

Unable to fully understand her condition, Asfa was afraid of the new environment and clung tightly to her mother. Not wanting her to develop a fear of hospitals, Azleen let her dress up in pretty outfits before each session to give her a more positive experience. Asfa also attended therapeutic play sessions to help her understand her treatment process.

Back home, hygiene became a central focus. As she could not go out as freely as she wanted to, Asfa's parents decided to bring the outdoors to her. "We built a mini playground for her at home. We also purchased toys similar to her favourite ones at the CCF@KKH Playroom to help her ease into the hospital environment."

The Playroom was a bright spot for Asfa during her hospital stays. Besides playing with the toys, she also got to meet new friends there. CCF's help extended well beyond the hospital walls to her learning journey. She enrolled in Place for Academic Learning and Support (PALS), where she attended lessons on reading, writing as well as life skills. "The life skills were especially beneficial as she was taught to be more independent," says Azleen.

Even when Asfa's active treatment ended, CCF continued to surround her with support. When she returned to a mainstream school, her social worker helped her assimilate, speaking to her teachers and helping her overcome social challenges.



Throughout the journey, CCF also embraced Asfa's parents. From free weekly massages at the hospital to Time for a Caring Chat focus group sessions facilitated by both medical and health professionals, CCF provided space for the couple to practise self-care, make friends and learn from other caregivers. The CCF Parent Buddy Programme was especially helpful for Azleen. "I was so clueless. But my buddy shared her experiences and prepared me for what Asfa and I needed to do and go through."

Thankful for the support she received, Azleen was more than ready to give back when asked to be a buddy. "I'm so glad that I'm now able to help others and share everything I've learnt."

One key piece of advice Azleen has for other CCF caregivers is this: "Cry when you need to cry, then bounce back up. The more times you bounce, the easier it gets and the stronger you'll become. You will also need a support system, so ask for help from family or friends."

Now seven, Asfa loves small bags and all things that glitter. "I want to be an artist! I love to draw!" she exclaims clutching a sparkly pink unicorn-shaped bag, full of hope for the future.

Open Studio

With new facilities in place, the new Open Studio introduces art mediums such as clay and pastels to help shape the practice of mindfulness.

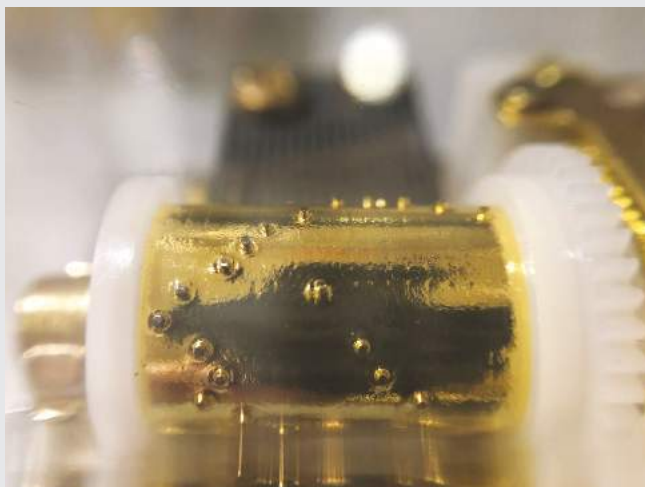
Shaping clay aims to teach CCF children to slow down and experience the physical-sensory-mental aspects of working their fingers through the clay. Nagomi art, the art of smudging pastels, is also introduced with the intention to encourage participants to grow in attentiveness and self-compassion.



Photovoice 2021

Photovoice 2021, a platform for youth survivors to express themselves through photography, took place in the month of July in the form of a three-part webinar. Themed "This is How We Overcome", the series was conducted by award-winning 'Singaporean Son' photographer, Mr Edwin Koo and professional photographer Mr Jonathan Mohan. CCF childhood cancer survivors, Yi Jun and Qin Han, who have been participating in Photovoice for several years were also invited to share their photography experiences on navigating change and sustaining continuity in pandemic times.

It was an eye-opening experience for the 12 participants as they picked up practical tips and techniques on photography. Beyond the hard skills, they also gained a deeper understanding on how photography can play a part in framing their minds to conquer all the 'C's in their lives – Cancer, COVID-19, Continuing life after cancer and Coping with new norms.

She is looking forward to the start of ComFur Zone, an animal-assisted activity slated to begin in the last quarter of 2021.
